

The Great Commission Study

After Jesus' death and resurrection, He appeared to the people He disciplined and sent them out with the mission of making disciples of all the nations. Jesus told them to teach these new disciples to obey everything He commanded. We call this "The Great Commission" (Matt. 28:18-20). The goal of this study is help you learn what these commands are so that you can then apply them to your life and become a mature disciple of Jesus who obeys all that He has commanded. This will also help equip you to be able to then go out and make more disciples and fulfill Jesus' mission.

Step One

- Make two documents on your computer. One document will be for the positive commands and characteristics, and the other for the negative commands and characteristics.
- Then you are going to read through the New Testament book by book and copy every verse that states either a command or a characteristic, and put it into the appropriate document (positive or negative). In some cases, you may need to copy a whole passage to get the full meaning, but generally you should copy one verse at a time.
- You will notice that some verses may have both a positive and negative command in the same verse. You should put that verse on both lists. You will also notice that some verses do not directly state a command but are clearly implying a characteristic that is good for Christians to do or to be.
 - For example, in Matthew 5:3, Jesus says that the Kingdom belongs to those who are "poor in spirit" or humble. This is an important characteristic for us to have, so you should add this to the positive list.

Step Two

- After you copy each verse into your document, then above the verse, write the command in your own words in **Bold**. The goal here is to shorten the verse to just the command, and to think back over what the command is. Where applicable, try to write it in the first person. So for Matthew 5:3, I would write, "I should be humble."

Step Three

- As you write the command in your own words, if it is something you need to work on, then below the verse (without bold), make a bullet point and write how you can practically apply it to your life this week. Make sure you do this in first person (I should...).
- The goal of this third step is to help you think about how to practically apply these commands to your own life which is what will help you learn to love God and others to higher levels.
 - **Note-** You don't have to write something for every command, especially ones you don't struggle with. To balance this, the more you stop and think about these commands and how to practically apply them, the more this study will help you grow.
- Below is an example of how to do this study for the first ten verses of Colossians 3.

Positive Commands and Characteristics

I should seek the things above

Colossians 3:1 (NASB 2020) ¹"Therefore, if you have been raised with Christ, keep seeking the things *that are* above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God."

I should set my mind on the things of God

Colossians 3:2 (NASB 2020) ²"Set your minds on the things *that are* above, not on the things that are on earth."

- I should think about God more while I'm at work. I could try listening to the Bible when I drive to work.

Negative Commands and Characteristics

I should not set my mind on the things of this earth

Colossians 3:2 (NASB 2020) ²Set your minds on the things *that are* above, not on the things that are on earth."

- I need to not set my mind on the things here on earth because they can distract me and hinder me from loving God and others.

Put to death the sinful ways of immorality, impurity, passion, evil desire and greed, which is idolatry.

Colossians 3:5–7 (NASB 2020) ⁵Therefore, treat the parts of your earthly body as dead *to* sexual immorality, impurity, passion, evil desire, and greed, which amounts to idolatry. ⁶*For it is* because of these things *that* the wrath of God is coming upon the sons of disobedience, ⁷and in them you also once walked, when you were living in them."

- I need to work on not being greedy. I should find some more ways to give to others and be more thankful for what I do have.

I should rid myself of all anger, wrath, malice, slander and obscene speech

Colossians 3:8 (NASB 2020) ⁸But now you also, rid yourselves of all of them: anger, wrath, malice, slander, *and* obscene speech from your mouth."

- I need to first make sure that I don't hold anger in my heart towards anyone and that I'm quick to forgive so that anger doesn't lead me to these other sins.
- I also need to make sure I don't speak negatively about anyone else.

I shouldn't lie to others

Colossians 3:9 (NASB 2020) ⁹Do not lie to one another, since you stripped off the old self with its *evil* practices,"

- I need to make sure I'm not lying to people at work because I've laid aside the ways of sin and I now represent Christ wherever I am.

The normal plan for this study is to do it along with the Old Testament Overview Study. You will normally do 21 chapters per week in each study (three chapters in each study each day, so 6 total chapters). You may want to start this study by doing Colossians, and then compare your list for chapter 3 with the list above. Also, make sure you pray each time before you spend time with God in His word. Ask Him to teach you the truth of His word and to help you apply these things to your life.

- **Note-** If you prefer not to do this study on a computer you can do it in a notebook. If you do this in a notebook, skip step one and just write down the reference and then summarize the commands for each verse instead of writing the whole passage out by hand.
